Angel Tree Angels needed

Been a hard year for a number of families—pandemic closures, wildfires, drought, any number of unfortunate events. That is what pulls at a parent's heart and conscience when Santa is expected and there is just no wiggle room in the budget. That is where the Angel Tree comes in.

The school staff pulls together a list of children with needs, their sizes, their interests. These tags are hung on a Christmas tree prominently placed in the fire hall for you to select. After selecting your tag(s) Tina Fisher will make sure your tag numbers and your name is recorded so they know who goes with what. If you ask, they probably can give you some good ideas on the child's interests.

Be sure to get the gifts to the school by the middle of Dec. so they can be delivered to the students before winter break.

Plikat Logging of Winston in Douglas County has been named Operator of the Year for Southwest Oregon.

The Oregon Board of Forestry will honor owner Wally Plikat and his crew along with two other regional awardees at its Jan. 5 meeting in Salem.

"Plikat Logging took on a difficult operation on a unit in Douglas County that bordered a busy state highway and had two different utility powerlines running through it as well as a fishbearing stream and wetlands. Excellent communication and coordination with utilities during logging prevented any damage to powerlines, avoiding disruptions to customers.

Thoughtful selection of access roads and timing more logging at night also avoided traffic delays on the bordering highway. Felling parallel to the stream and choosing landing sites carefully also helped preserve intact the buffer zone protecting the stream and wetlands."

The Southwest Regional Forest Practices Committee also recognized with an Award of Merit Blaylock, Inc., a logging firm owned by Fred Blaylock of Coquille in Coos County. —-KPIC

As part of that 10-year, multi-trillion package, the House Committees on Agriculture and Natural Resources have included over \$15 billion for hazardous fuel treatments, hundreds of millions to State, Tribal, and local firefighters to help them with equipment and training to tackle wildfires, and billions to help communities create fuel projects, do treatments on private lands, and clear defensible space around structures. These are all investments that will reduce the risk of

pacts on communities.

In July, then U.S. Forest Service Chief Vicki Christiansen, testifying before a Senate Committee, called for a "paradigm shift" in the country's investmitigation—a doubling to a quadrupling of current forest fuel treatments. After decades of neglect, forests full of burnamate, the billions now under consideration in Congress answer that call. However, if the U.S. is truly going to get ahead of this problem, we need true paradigm shifts in all areas of Outthink Wildfire™, including retrofitting homes in the wildland urban interface (WUI), following the latest codes and best land use practices, and educating residents on steps they need to take to reduce their own risk. Every leader, from the President down to governors, county managers, and mayors, should echo these calls to action.
